So where is the moral outrage? It's been eclipsed by environmental panic. In 1963, Rachel Carson's book, *Silent Spring*, claimed DDT was destroying the environment. It led to the banning of DDT in the United States



and pressure on the developing world not to use the chemical.

Malaria, nearly eradicated by DDT in some countries, has been steadily on the rise. Today, most of Carson's 1963 assertions have been debunked by modern science. Yet rock stars, environmentalists and the World Health Organization tout the use of

marginally-effective bed nets, failing to even mention the use of DDT in prevention.

The result? Millions of people in developing countries are dying. Mostly women and children in Africa and Asia.
